The registration fee includes training materials and continental breakfast.

This intensive one day training will cover current ICE enforcement mechanisms and key issues on the immigration consequences of crimes. The ICE enforcement presentations will review state and local law enforcement partnerships, detainers, detention policies and practices. The selected issues on immigration and crimes include the categorical approach, analyzing domestic violence offenses and drug crimes. The training materials will provide information on immigration enforcement and will include the CLINIC Immigration and Crimes Manual. The goal of the training is to educate attorneys and legalworkers on the immigration consequences of criminal convictions and provide information about the current status of immigration enforcement policies and practices.

The training will be presented by Kristina Karpinski and Debbie Smith, CLINIC Attorneys in Boston and San Francisco. Local speakers include Mary Holper, Associate Professor of Law and Director of the Immigration Clinic at Roger Williams University School of Law, Ragini Shah, Associate Clinical Professor of Law, Suffolk University Law School, Dan Kesselbrenner, Director of the National Immigration Project of the National Lawyers Guild, Wendy Wayne, Director of the Immigration Impact Unit, Committee for Public Counsel Services, Elizabeth Badger, Visiting Assistant Professor of Law, Boston University School of Law and Heather Friedman, Detention Attorney, Political Asylum/Immigration Representation Project. The training is accredited for State of Vermont CLE credit, including one hour of ethics.

The training is intended for attorneys, Catholic Charities and other community-based organizations with IRS 501(c)(3) status staff with experience or interest in representing immigrants in removal proceedings.
